David Erickson, Senior Vice President and Head of Outreach & Education, called the meeting to order at 3:05pm.

1. Welcome

John C. Williams, President and CEO, greeted members. Mr. Williams then provided a brief

overview of the current state of the economy.

2. Opening

Maria Carmelita Recto outlined the Community Advisory Group's protocols and provided meeting logistics.

3. CAG charter and antitrust guidelines review

Justine Hansen reminded members of their responsibilities under the charter and the antitrust guidelines.

4. Regional and National Economic Conditions

Laura Pilossoph, Senior Economist, Jason Bram, Research Officer, and John C. Williams answered questions from members on national and regional economic conditions.

5. Roundtable Discussion with Community Advisory Group Membership

Members participated in a roundtable discussion on how local communities are responding to current economic trends. Perspectives included: increased transportation costs for workers needing to use ride-hailing services such as Uber, increased occurrence of households merging to bring down housing costs, increased use of private and public pantries, and increased use of nonprofit services because of higher prices; an observed increase in lower-income migrant families moving from New York City to upstate New York and to the Sunbelt region; continued concerns around persistent high unemployment especially around women of color; the compounding impact of unresolved trauma from the pandemic on the mental health of children and families, and on workforce productivity; lower-income individuals and families using savings from pandemic supports to close short-term budget deficits; some food- and restaurant-related small businesses in New Jersey expressed optimism in their recovery in the near future; an observed increase in informal entrepreneurial activities in Puerto Rico as the local unemployment rate goes down; and an increase in the migration of remote workers but a shortage of workers for hurricane-recovery plans in the US Virgin Islands.

6. Closing

Following the discussion, John C. Williams thanked members for their participation.
