



FRBNY Business Surveys, Current Conditions




Recent Private-Sector Job Trends

Year-Over-Year Percent Change as of August 2018




Private-Sector Job Trends

Percent Change From Previous Peak to August 2018




Unemployment Rates

Seasonally Adjusted




Labor Force Participation

Seasonally Adjusted





Total Employment in Thousands, Aug 2018 (QCEW Q1, 2018)






Total Employment in Thousands, Aug 2018 (QCEW Q1, 2018)











FRBNY Early Employment Benchmark

Total Employment in Thousands, Aug 2018 (QCEW Q12018)




Total Employment

Seasonally Adjusted Index





Seasonally Adjusted Index




Employment Before & After Selected Hurricanes


Index (Month Before Hurricane = 100)





Puerto Rico Sectoral Job Trends Since Maria


Thousands of Jobs lost/gained since Aug. 2017 (Before Maria), S.A.












Urbanization


- What constitutes "Urban"?
 - Official definition is broad: urban vs <u>rural</u> areas—treats suburban as urban.
 - Census defines <u>all</u> of NJ (and most of the Hudson Valley) as urban.
 - Urban can also be defined by density of economic activity (employment), walkability, access to public transit, nighttime light (satellite imagery), etc.
- Has the de-urbanization trend reversed?
 - Research is mixed, but suggests the trend has at least slowed markedly.
 - Does this jibe with the general sense that many cities (i.e. in our region) have revived—New York City, Buffalo, Albany, Troy, Poughkeepsie, etc?
 - If the de-urbanization tide has slowed or stopped, then many cities should be doing better than average—with some out-performing their suburbs.
 - Even cities that have not seen a strong rebound in population may be seeing a rise in affluence, quality of life measures, and economic vitality.






- Real-time information at a very detailed, localized level.
- Research suggests strong correlation with economic activity.







Regional Recap

- New York City remains the leader in job growth in the region.
- Much of upstate NY & Fairfield County continue to lag.
- Puerto Rico has yet to fully recover from hurricanes.
- Housing markets have been fairly robust in New York City and in metro Buffalo & Rochester.
- The city-to-suburbs trend appears to have halted.
- Some cities, especially larger ones, have seen an upturn.
